## **CHAPTER TWO**

HOW: 3. Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light.

WHAT 4. God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness.

WHEN 5. God called the light day, and the darkness He called night.

WHERE 6. And there was evening and there was morning, one day.

So what am I supposed to do—guess the answer to each question? Yes. You can do it, Joe. But try to refrain from saying that God created a physical earth. Give it a shot on the first sentence.

That's easy. "WHO" is God.

Next?

WHY what? Why did God create what He created? Yes.
